"O BELOVED MOTHER MARY": This is the Marian prayer left to us by our fathers. Our congregation says it every evening at the end of the liturgy of Vespers. With the whole church, the religious Cavanis thank the Lord with the Canticle of the Virgin Mary, and with the Founders renew their trust "in the sweetest love and the patronage of their dear Mother". Our fundamental Marian icon is therefore that of Mary, Mother of God and Mother of the disciples. The Founders have always felt and loved, invoked and preached her in this way. So, for this icon we turn to the Gospel of St. John, who being



the dearest to Jesus, the disciple he loved, perhaps he also felt most reverent affection and love for mother of Jesus. Mary is on Calvary, at the foot of the Cross on which they confined her Son. The dying Jesus "seeing his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother, "Woman, here is your son." Then he said to the disciple, "Here is your mother". And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home." (Jn. 19:26-27). Fr. Anthony observes, "He leaves us Mary for Mother, if we are willing to be disciples," if we are willing to take her into our home, a participant and support of our consecrated life and apostolate. Dependent on this fundamental icon, we find other images of Mary for the three parts into which the prayer in which our Fathers taught us to ask daily and insistently is divided:

- 1. Holiness for us and for all;
- 2. That our Institute may grow and be strengthened to the glory of God and for the good of the "abandoned" youth;
- 3. The victory over evil, with the help of the Immaculata, and a blessing on all sacrifices and educational commitments intended to "gather, watch and lead the youth to the heavenly home".



Beloved mother Mary, do not look at our unworthiness, but rather on your most gentle maternal love, and implore for us the great grace to see our devout Congregation grow up with renewed strength, to the greater glory of God and the salvation of many helpless young people.

Beloved mother Mary, you are so terrible against evil repress with your power the dreadful slaughter the devil is doing of poor children lacking in education and support by your protection the efforts we made to gather them, watch over them and lead them to our heavenly home.
