
Dear friends,

Pope Francis has spoken many times about hope, which he defines as "the smallest of the virtues, but the strongest. And our hope has a face: the face of the risen Lord, who comes 'with great power and glory' (Mk 13:26). Hope, therefore, is not something, but someone, just as St. Francis exclaims in the Praises of God Most High: 'You are our hope!' (FF 261). And "He will not abandon all those who hope in him" (FF 287; cf. Ps 33:23).

"Hope is a risky virtue, a virtue, as St. Paul says, of ardent expectation of the revelation of the Son of God (Rom 8:19). It is not an illusion. It is a virtue that never disappoints: if you hope, you will never be disappointed". It is a concrete virtue, an everyday virtue because it is an encounter. And every time we encounter Jesus in the Eucharist, in prayer, in the Gospel, in the poor, in community life, every time we take another step toward this definitive encounter.

Hope requires patience, just as patience is needed to see the mustard seed grow. It is "the patience of knowing that we sow, but it is God who gives the growth."

Hope is not passive optimism but, on the contrary, "it is combative, with the tenacity of those who are moving toward a sure goal."
